UCC General Synod 32

General Synod 32 was held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Several Western area people were in attendance as either delegates or visitors.

Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer was re-elected as General Minister and President, but not without controversy, due to his straight, male, whiteness. Rev. Dorhauer also believes the time has come for a female to fill that role, and encouraged females to listen to God's call, as well as committing to not seeking another term.

The most controversial resolution was "Stewardship Of Exhibit Space As A Mission Of Justice," which proposed that no group demeaning any part of the body of Christ or working against civil and human rights for LGBTQ people or any other constituency shall be allowed exhibit space in General Synod halls and that the mission of "Faithful and Welcoming Churches" be rejected. Faithful and Welcoming Churches (FWC) is a very conservative group of UCC churches whose literature is hurtful to LGBTQ brothers and sisters. There was much discussion among visitors and delegates throughout the days leading up to the vote on this resolution. People were torn between the hurt FWC has caused some people and the UCC's very own message of "No matter who you are, or where you are on life's journey, you're welcome here."

There are several other resolutions of note that should be discussed by our churches and the Western Area. A summary document has been attached to the Western Area website and can be found at https://wnyuccdoc.wixsite.com/wnyacic/general-synod-32. This document only has a brief description of each resolution to give everybody a general idea of what it is about. I strongly encourage you to view the detailed resolutions on the UCC Synod website, where you can also view videos of the plenaries and worship services. There is a link to this on the Western Area website, which also contains a more detailed synopsis of this Synod, and Synod in general. You can either scroll through the entire page or get to a specific category more quickly by clicking the underlined text under "What Happens at Synod." The smartphone display of this page has just been cleaned up; so please revisit this if your previous visit was unpleasant.

I visited the Center for Analytics, Research and Data (CARD) booth. These folks do more than just publish the Yearbook and Directory. There is all kind of data and information available; they will help with special research projects. Their website is www.ucc.org/research.

I also learned of two great learning opportunities that maybe several churches could collaborate in. Rev. Anne Robertson, author of "Exploring the Bible: The Dickinson Series," is coming out with a new Bible Study called "Exploring Justice, The Ten Commandments." This will be a three-part curriculum, just like "Exploring the Bible." And the time has come for all churches to engage in the WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged) mental health curriculum. Churches need to be the leaders of society and must be educated.

There was also much fun at Synod. Dona Roll was travelling throughout the convention hall and exhibit hall with the Statue of Liberty, in search of New Yorkers to get their pictures taken as the face of Lady Liberty. But she also asked any, and all, other people in her path if they wanted their pictures taken. Although not all accepted the offer, all were amused.

The main source of income for the Western Area is derived from the Covenantal Shares paid by our member churches. The 2019 shares are based on the 2018 membership reported by each church in the Western Area. At \$6.00 per member, ours is the lowest rate in the state. The following churches made Covenantal Share payments between May 10 and August 14 : Church of the Nativity (Town of Tonawanda); Ebenezer UCC (West Seneca); Epiphany UCC (Clarence); Good Shepherd Community of Faith (Buffalo); Kenilworth UCC (Tonawanda); Lockport UCC; Pilgrim St. Luke's UCC (Buffalo); St. John's UCC (Dunkirk); St. Matthew's UCC (Hamburg); St. Paul's UCC (Shawnee); and United Baptist Christian Church (Lewiston).

In addition to the Covenantal Shares, our United Church of Christ congregations are being asked to pay a new Per Capita, which is \$2.00 per member, as reported in the 2018 Yearbook. Per Capita payments are payable to the Western Area, which then sends the entire amount to the New York Conference. The following UCC churches made Per Capita payments between May 10 and August 14: Church of the Nativity; Epiphany; Good Shepherd; Kenilworth; and St. Matthew's.

Letters will be sent to each church in September to update them on their 2019 giving and to let them know what their amounts will be in 2020.

To avoid confusion, UCC churches are reminded when they send a check to indicate whether it is for Covenantal Shares or Per Capita. If paying for both in a single check, please indicate the breakdown so you receive the correct credit. Thank you!

Disciples Open New Chautauqua Housing Unit

Chautauqua Association of the Disciples of Christ have built a new facility to replace one of their two housing units at Chautauqua. The Greybiel House, used for over 100 years, finally had to be replaced. After some unexpected problems at the beginning of the project, the new housing unit was completed (miraculously) for opening week of the 2019 session.

This new facility is a year-round facility and is available for off-season conferences and events. It is a five-story facility with a basement, first-floor kitchen, dining room and conference room, plus three floors of bedrooms, with several different layouts. It even has an elevator! It is an accessible facility, with heating and air conditioning.

It cost approximately \$2 million, and fund raising events are still going on. They hope to have such an event the week between Christmas and the New Year so make plans now to participate. More information will be forthcoming.

The fundraising has surpassed more than half of the cost of the facility, and a mortgage was obtained from the Disciples of Christ Church Extension Office. We encourage church groups and other organizations to look into holding meetings and conferences there. Agreement with the United Church of Canada; a celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Design of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the Merger Agreement, with sermons by Rev. Dr. Cynthia L. Hale and Rev. Mark Briley, who explored the past, present, and future of our Church.

Disciples served in missions all across the greater Des Moines community that week. They also debuted a MissionFest in the exhibit hall, in which congregations shared the unique community ministries they've launched at home. The exhibit hall was also full of other mission projects anyone could participate in, like writing letters to elected officials, donating blood, and tying blankets.

It was also announced that some of the country's biggest politically progressive religious leaders would be going to El Paso to take part in a responsive action against current U.S. Immigration policies in the first 'Moral Monday in the Borderlands.' The event was scheduled for Sunday, July 28 and Monday, July 29. This was announced before the recent domestic terrorist attack in El Paso.

Moral Monday is being led by nationally renowned progressive Disciple of Christ faith leader Rev. Dr. William J. Barber, II, who has advocated the use of civil disobedience in order to create political change to issues of faith and conscience. Previous protests have covered voting rights, environment, and racial justice issues. Some have resulted in arrests.

Organizers say local clergy, faith leaders, and members of Congress were invited to participate and more than 215 confirmed participation in the event, which culminated with a large, non-violent protest.

Justice for Migrant Families is non-profit, volunteer organization in Western New York committed to assisting and advocating for undocumented families and asylum seekers. It connects families to free legal assistance, organizes volunteers to visit folks at the Batavia Federal Detention Center, provides presence and support at their court hearings, raises and provides funds for emergency needs, and seeks housing for those released from the Batavia facility who have no family in this country. Previously Vive was able to house these persons, but due to the huge influx of Congolese asylum seekers that arrived from the southern border in July it no longer has space.

Currently there is a need for people to offer short term (1-4 weeks) or long term (1-3 months) housing for people being released on parole or bond while awaiting their court appearances. Free or inexpensive housing is also being sought for a family of 6-7 persons, preferably, but not necessarily, in the Williamsville School district. Senior Wishes Expands Into Genesee, Wyoming and Orleans Counties

Jim, a Korean War Veteran, attended a BPO concert for the first time since eighth grade, and Annie celebrated her heritage at the Gullah Festival in South Carolina. Senior Wishes, WNY's only program dedicated to enriching the lives of deserving seniors by granting meaningful wishes, is now expanding to serve residents of Genesee, Wyoming and Orleans counties, in addition to Erie and Niagara counties.

Established in 2013 by the United Church Home Society (UCHS), Senior Wishes' mission is to honor and recognize the lifelong contributions of our oldest citizens by granting meaningful wishes that will enhance seniors' lives.

According to Wendy Miller Backman, Senior Wishes Executive Director, "Senior Wishes was created to recognize that our aging seniors still have things they want to do, places they want to go, or people they want to see. We transform those dreams into a reality."

The program has granted over 200 wishes in Erie and Niagara counties, and strives to grant more wishes to seniors by expanding into more counties. Wish requests may be big or small. Previous wishes have included air travel to visit long-missed family, cheering on a favorite team in person, and revisiting an abandoned hobby.

Wish recipients must be 65+ and a resident of Western New York with an annual income under \$38,000 for a household of one or under \$44,000 for a household of two. Permanent residents of care facilities are exempt from the income qualification. Vacations, medical items, household repairs, bill payments and travel outside of the continental U.S. are excluded.

Endowment Fund at Mid-2019

The Endowment Fund of the Western New York United Church of Christ and Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) in Covenant held \$433,087.94 on June 30, 2019.

That was some \$20,956 greater than the assets held at the end of 2018 – despite the distribution during the first part of this year of \$22,300 to our various ministries. These included Plymouth Crossroads, the Dunkirk Camp and Conference Center and several area Community Ministries programs, including the Senior Wishes program of the United Church Home Society.

"We did OK in the first half of 2019," Jeff Mason, fund treasurer said. "But now we must see how the stock market does in the second half."

Community Nurse Notes Healthy Meals: Where to start?

Planning and preparation are keys to consistently cooking healthy food on a budget. Instead of worrying about each day's menu and each meal's serving size, planning ahead means you have pantry, fridge and freezer items ready to whip up healthy, well-balanced meals. Saving yourself or your family from relying on take-out or restaurant meals will ease your budget and help you meet your health goals.

*Schedule a weekly trip to the grocery store or explore curb-side pickup or online ordering with delivery to save time.

*Shop your pantry first. Base your weekly recipes on what you've already got on hand to save time and money.

***Prepare** a grocery list that has specific recipes in mind and stick to it.

*Come home with more than a bag of good intentions! Chop those vegetables up and store in containers ready for use. Plan to use them on nights when your schedule is most pressed for time.

***Establish** theme nights to help with planning and variety. Have a healthy pizza night, a slow-cooker day, or a soup and sandwich night.

***Pick up** broccoli slaw for salads. Broccoli slaw is precut, tastes great, and keeps well.

*Make a simple vegetable soup. Freeze soup in ziptop bags lying flat on a cookie sheet. This will stack easily, and the soup is healthier than canned soup. *Cook shelf-stable spaghetti squash and serve with pasta sauce for a quick Italian dish.

***Precook** staple ingredients for a veggie bowl. Include a grain, such as quinoa, couscous, or brown rice. Precook a vegetable, such as roasted broccoli. Or dig into the frozen veggies you keep stocked in your freezer.

***Supplement** precooked grains and veggies with an easy protein, such as boiled egg or cheese. Voila! You have a healthy meal!

Meal planning and prepping will save you time and money in the long run. If you find it a challenge to carve out a space for that, consider turning it into a treat. Take your meal prep time to listen to that podcast you've been saving or the audiobook you borrowed from the library. Invite a friend over to fellowship in the kitchen with you while you both tackle your meal preps, or even claim the meal planning and prep time as much-needed alone time! Whatever your strategy is, your budget and your health will thank you.

I was asked to write an article about the "new things" we're doing at Zion UCC, and truth-be-told, it's hard to pick one. If you look at our church within the last nine years, we've tried many "new things." As we live and grow into who we are as a community of faith, we try new things, some of which succeed, some of which fail, all the time.

Our most recent "new thing" is our Sanctuary renovation that is currently going on. The reality is that we need more space in our chancel area. Our choir is growing, and our Sunday School program is growing, and we decided that instead of squeezing everyone into a narrow space, we would renovate the chancel area to create a large space at the front of the church.

Needless to say, this is something the church leadership has been mulling over for a couple years, but this year it became evident that we needed to bring this idea to the Congregation and start the renovations.

As we renovate this new space, we're constantly balancing two thoughts that are equally important to us: 1. What configuration is going to benefit the church for the next 20 year? 2. How do we maintain the history of the space to honor the work that was originally put into the Sanctuary?

When doing a "new thing" in a church, we have found that it's important to honor these two thoughts. We are a growing church looking into the future, but we also need to maintain our history, and these two ideas do not need to be mutually exclusive.

One of our finest brainstorming events was a couple years ago, when we first started "dreaming" together as a church to decide what we need our worship space to look like and what programs we need to offer as a community of faith. We had a large group of people, from teenagers to our senior members and everyone in-between who attended this brainstorming event one evening. And the most fascinating discussion came over whether or not we wanted to keep our pews (or replace them with chairs), and the group that was most against removing the pews might surprise you... it was the teenagers. Our teens love this church – it's truly a sanctuary to them, and the thought of putting chairs into the worship space instead of pews is not something they are comfortable with - it would take away the sense of "holy" to some of them.

The youth might love the contemporary worship music, but they also love the pews – they're an eclectic bunch (aren't we all). This is just one example of how we balance the new and the traditional. We look forward to the future while honoring the past. We grow and change while remembering our history.

So, we're doing some new things here at Zion UCC. Currently it's renovating the Sanctuary. Next it will be ensuring our church is Accessible to All (A2A), and there's a list of things to come after.

God is always doing a new thing with us; we're just trying to keep up.

Coffee in the Sanctuary



In March 2019, *In the Vineyard* asked, "What new thing is your church doing this year?" *Ginny Taber of Faith UCC, Boston* reported that the church would be providing a free coffee for parishioners to enjoy during worship. Here is an update:

"Generally speaking the Coffee Bar was well received. Many folks get their coffee (or tea) and gather for conversation outside the sanctuary. We had to implement a special song the organist would play to get people to move into the sanctuary on time. It's a new mindset to many, myself included. I was always taught that food and beverage were not to be taken into worship. If a cup of coffee that we provide brings people to church rather than Tim Hortons, then we have something good going.

"For Summer, we have cut back on how much coffee is made but added ice water, lemonade and ice tea. We needed to post a schedule for individuals who sign up for a week to be responsible to make coffee, etc. and clean up. We also posted instructions on how to use the new coffee maker and a timeline so folks will be able to arrive early enough to prepare everything. We put out a small decorated can to collect donations and that seems to be covering costs.

"As Fall approaches, hopefully some parents that drop their children off to Sunday School will stay and enjoy their coffee here, rather than the local coffee shop. Maybe even get involved with the Christian Education program! Wouldn't that be great! All from a cup of coffee...."

The Sewing Project is making strides. Seven villages now have women who have learned to sew and are ready to teach other women in their village. New treadle sewing machines have been bought for each of these villages. And just recently, sturdy wooden sewing furniture, a table, straight chair and a white board, have been delivered to the villages. This furniture was made by students at CEVER, the vocational school in Yoro.



Another current project is the building of a new middle school for the lower villages so more students will be able to go beyond 6th grade. The Honduran government recently approved the project and site. Some students have actually started 7th grade with a teacher working in someone's home! But they really need a school. We hope to start a seventh grade classroom soon and eventually have a six-room building near the elementary school in Mescales.
