### The Season of Advent

Advent. In linguistics, Advent is recognized as deriving for the Latin advenio and tus or adventus. Its English linguistical translation means "arrival" or "coming". While the word "advent" can and is used in a variety of ways in our English and American languages (such as the advent of a special celebration or the advent of particular period in our life), it most generally is understood in Christianity as a season - the four weeks and Sundays leading to, preparing for and remembering the sacred and holy day on which we celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Christ. The beginning of Advent, or Advent Sunday, can occur from November 27 to December 3 and actually falls on December 1 (as it does this year) only when Christmas Day is on a Wednesday. No one is sure when Advent actually was first recognized, but it dates to at least 567 CE when it is recorded that monks were ordered to fast during December leading up to Christmas. Now that we've established what Advent is, how do we live into it?

Unfortunately, I believe many folk in this 21<sup>st</sup> century totally lose sight of Advent's celebration. To many it has become the time for frivolity and merry-making in recognition of the coming of Santa Claus. It is a time for decorating, parties, baking, shopping and (lest we forget) Christmas music!! For all too many, Advent is considered to begin the day after Thanksgiving – Black Friday – when everything (and I mean everything) becomes Christmas oriented.

But for the Christian, Advent actually has three meanings. First, and the one most thought of, is the recognition of the event some 2000 years ago when Jesus was born in Bethlehem as a son to Mary and Joseph, and who grew into manhood as the Son of God to teach, heal and ultimately die for us for the forgiveness of sins. History records healings, miracles and other signs performed by this born-on-Christmas salvific Son of God which instill, in each of us, the desire to learn more and to change the way we live our lives. This leads to the second meaning of the season of Advent – Jesus wants to enter our lives now to change the way we live, think, act and speak. You've no doubt seen the painting by William Holman Hunt of Jesus at the door knocking. You'll notice there is no handle on the outside of the door – it must be opened from the inside. Advent is the time Jesus especially wants us to open this door and let him enter.

The third meaning of Advent can be the eschatological meaning. Eschatological is a fancy word meaning the "end times" – when the world ceases to exist. Scripturally this time is when Jesus comes again as King and Judge. As no one knows the time of this event, so Advent can be the time in which we live prior to this scriptural fulfillment.

Advent – coming. Whether you undertake this 25-day Christian season with calendars, candles, special readings, special prayers, fasting or any number of other traditions, remember what Advent is for us, as Christians. Then prepare yourself for the coming of Jesus, the Christ. My prayer is that each and every one of us may live into a most blessed and meaningful Advent this year. Shalom.

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### In Memoriam

Gordon Frederick Comstock, MD passed away on October 25, 2019 at the age of 76 from Acute Myeloid Leukemia. Born on January 27, 1943 in Miami, Florida, Gordon was the first child of epidemiologist George Wills Comstock and community activist Margaret (Karr) Comstock. Gordon met his wife and life partner, Ginger (Virginia) Kelly, at Antioch College in Ohio, where he majored in Chemistry and the Maples Volunteer Fire Department. Gordon joined the Peace Corps, teaching math in Ghana for two years before marrying Ginger on July 27, 1968. Gordon studied medicine at Case Western Reserve University and completed his residency at University of Rochester/Highland Hospital Family Medicine Program. From 1980 to 2018, Dr. Comstock practiced family medicine in Arcade, serving the area's youngest to oldest residents with patience and respect.

Always an Eagle Scout, Gordon believed in leaving his campsite - and the world - better than he found it. He dedicated his life to service and teaching. Gordon was originally contracted for two years in a "doctor shortage" area, and because of the people and the community spirit, he and his family chose to stay in Arcade. Gordon mentored numerous medical students in family medicine at his office and then took them home for dinner. From 1989 to 2017, Gordon made 29 trips to La Laguna, Honduras as a part of NY/HELP mission. He inspired Ginger, both daughters, and at least eight community members to travel with him, and they were supported by countless others. Both Gordon and Ginger have been continuously active with NY/HELP, and Gordon became the medical

director. He learned Spanish to communicate with the clinic nurse and patients, graciously accepting language corrections and retranslations. Learning from and serving the people of the La Laguna region were sources of joy for him.

In addition to his medical and mission work, Gordon could often be found with his nose in a book, mowing the lawn at his church, ensuring the high school football players made it safely off the field, or admiring the Arcade & Attica trains.

Gordon and Ginger raised two daughters, Barbara Comstock-King (Daniel King) of Lebanon, CT and Kimberly (Geoffrey [Morton]) Mortstock of Seattle, WA, and adored their three grandkids, Margaret "Maggie" and Elizabeth "Ella" King and Calvin Mortstock. Gordon is also survived by his brother Lloyd Comstock (Judy Kramer), sister Martha (Daniel) Williams, three nieces, and his stepmother, Emma Lou Comstock.

The following churches made Covenantal Share payments between August 15 and November 19: Amherst Community Church; Arcade UCC; Church of the Nativity (Town of Tonawanda); Cleveland Heights Christian Church (Cheektowaga); Covenant UCC (Gasport); East Aurora Christian Church; Ebenezer UCC (West Seneca); Faith UCC (Williamsville); Lockport UCC; Salem UCC (Tonawanda); St. Paul's UCC (Attica); St. Paul's UCC (Shawnee); St. Paul's UCC (Wendelville); St. Stephen's-Bethlehem UCC (Williamsville); Union Road Community Church (Cheektowaga); and Zion UCC (Town of Tonawanda).

Covenantal Shares are the Western Area's main source of income. At \$6.00 per reported member, ours has been the lowest rate in New York State for many years. The 2020 amount of \$6.00 per member will be based on the membership a church reported at the start of 2019. As reported at the November 3 Annual Meeting, the Western Area Council has reluctantly decided to raise the amount to \$8.00 per reported member for 2021, due to an increase in the projected deficit. The 2021 Covenantal Shares will be based on membership reported at the start of 2020.

In addition to the Covenantal Shares, our United Church of Christ congregations are asked by the NY Conference to send a \$2.00 per member Per Capita for the New York Conference. The 2019 Per Capita is based on the membership a church reported in the 2018 UCC Yearbook, and the 2020 amount is based on reported membership in the 2019 Yearbook. The following UCC churches made Per Capita payments between August 15 and November 19: Amherst Community; Church of the Nativity; Covenant; St. John's UCC (Dunkirk); St. Paul's (Attica); St. Paul's (Shawnee); St. Paul's (Wendelville); and Zion.

Covenantal Share money remains with the Western Area, while Per Capita money is sent to the New York Conference. To avoid confusion, UCC churches are reminded when they send a check, please indicate whether it is for Covenantal Shares or Per Capita. If paying for both in a single check, please indicate the breakdown so you receive the correct credit and so the treasurer forwards the correct amount to the New York Conference. Thank you! As noted in the last issue of In the Vineyard, the total value of the Endowment on June 30, 2019 was \$412,131.80. On September 30, the total value had increased to \$434,655.32. Based on that amount, a total of \$21,790 will be disbursed in January, as follows: \$6,537 each to Dunkirk Camp and Conference Center, Plymouth Crossroads, and the Department of Community Ministries; \$544.75 to the United Church Home Society for its Senior Wishes program; and \$1,634.25 to be retained by the Western Area to reduce the projected 2020 budget deficit.

# 2019 Dunkirk Family Camp 2

I had looked forward to Family Camp since February. It was the second year my 12-year-old grandson, Pierce, was able to fly in from Atlanta to go to Dunkirk with me. I saw old friends, watched my grandson play basketball, made a craft at the craft barn, went swimming and attended class every morning. I sat around the campfire with folks I enjoyed and don't see except at camp. I even had a three hour nap. How delightful!

I enjoyed the food at Dunkirk; from the pot full of oatmeal to the salad bar, to the main courses at supper time. My grandson said, "I wish family camp was two weeks long." Jay Rich said, "There's no way I could eat like this for two weeks." I gain at least three pounds from camp every year. Then there is the corn roast. Thirty-four years ago, I held the record for the most ears of corn eaten that night (it really was 18 ears). My body can't do that anymore. There is nothing like freshly roasted corn over the bonfire.

The Rich grandsons, Jake and Jeff, would emcee the talent show with their own routines; better than Jimmy Fallon. The jokes worked for the adults and the children. The only time I saw Pierce was during meals, at vespers and at bedtime. At the picnic he was eating with friends. We would talk about our classes. I told him I fell asleep in class on Wednesday and he laughed. What fun we were having with the old friends he was reacquainted with and new friends he had made. We would review what the next day was going to look like and say our good nights.

This is the second year we were in the cabin with Dave Wilson and Mark Vidaver and we all have so much fun together. Those two are so good with Pierce, always attentive and funny. I had brought a special formula for making bubbles and the adults enjoyed them as well as the children in the cabins around us. The guys had coffee pots so I always had a fresh cup whenever I wanted it.

Pierce adds: "At Dunkirk Camp, I had an amazing time. Everybody there is so nice and they always include everyone in activities and games. The food *is also so good and all their equipment is good too. They also make it so much easier to bring people together and make new friends."* 

Friday night vespers is a chance to make a donation for a specific need at Dunkirk or another cause. This past year, the offering was going to repair the kiddie pool (possibly with a splash pad), put some money in the scholarship fund for Family Camp 2 and also to buy a new ping pong table for our camp. A family stepped up to buy the ping pong table that will be kept just for our camp. It was the first year in a while that we hadn't had a ping pong tournament. The baskets were passed and this year, we collected \$6600.

Is Family Camp 2 alive and well? From the youngest infant to the 90-year-old retired pastor, there is life at Dunkirk. If you have never joined us, plan on it and get your reservation in early. We were almost to capacity in 2019, so who knows how many there will be in 2020?

# Community Nurse Notes January – National Blood Donor Awareness Month

January has been designated as National Blood Donor Month (NBDM) to encourage donors to give or pledge to give blood. First-time and regular donors are encouraged to make a difference in their communities by giving blood every January, and regularly thereafter.

Blood is traditionally in short supply during the winter months due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness. January, in particular, is a difficult month for blood centers to collect blood donations. A reduction in turnout can put our nation's blood inventory at a critical low.

Give blood. Don't wait for a disaster. Someone needs blood now! Contact the <u>American Red Cross</u> or your local blood bank for more information. Use #NationalBloodDonorMonth and #GiveBlood to share on social media. Here are some of the biggest reasons giving blood is so important:

- 1. About 36,000 units of red blood cells and 7,000 units of platelets are needed every single day in the U.S.
- 2. The most requested blood type by hospitals is type O. This kind of blood can be transfused to patients of all blood types, so it's always in great demand and in very short supply. Only 7% of people in the U.S. have type O.
- 3. A single car accident victim may need up to 100 pints of blood to survive.

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- 4. About 6.8 million people donate blood every year in the U.S.
- 5. 38% of our population is eligible to donate, but less than 10% actually do.
- Donating blood is a simple, safe process. All you have to do is register, take a mini medical history test, donate, and then accept free refreshments like water, Gatorade, granola bars, etc.
- 7. A single donation from a single patient can help more than one person.




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## ST. PETER'S PRESENTS CHRISTMAS COOKIE SALE

## Yule Log Burning



### Leader: Jonathan D. Lawrence

Rev. Dr. Jonathan D. Lawrence is an Associate Professor of Religious Studies, at Canisius College. He is ordained with the American Baptist Churches USA since 1998 and presently serves as pastor at St. Peter's UCC, North Tonawanda, since 2013.

This course will provide an introduction and overview of the Old Testament/Hebrew Bible, in its historical setting, with a focus on using it in preaching and church education. We will survey many of the significant stories in the Hebrew Bible, looking at their texts, genres, content, and connection to historical and cultural evidence. 
A World of Prayers is a collection of prayers from around the world with wonderful illustrations. From Ireland comes this morning prayer:

### THE ARCADE UCC, CONGREGATIONAL, PRIOR TO THE CIVIL WAR

The Arcade UCC, Congregational, is the oldest congregation in the Western Area, tracing its roots back to its founding in the summer of 1813. The Rev. John Spencer, a traveling missionary who planted the seeds for a number of churches in this end of the state, started our church with just six members. It was usually up to the deacon to keep the church going in the early years, but we eventually grew enough to be able to construct our first church building in 1834.

Later in the 1830s, we had the first of several pastors trained at Oberlin College in northern Ohio, which has a long tradition of progressive thought. For the next three decades, we were heavily influenced by the ideas of "Oberlin Perfectionism" when it came to the important social issues of the day. On the issue of slavery, for example, a perfectionist believed it was not enough for a Christian to say he or she was opposed to slavery. Instead, it was a Christian's duty to take active measures to bring about the abolition of slavery.

In January 1840, we hosted a convention of the Western New York Anti-Slavery Society. This was a follow-up to a meeting held in Warsaw two months earlier that is sometimes considered the origin of the Liberty Party. In the summer of 1844, we hosted the Grand Liberty Convention, which saw a huge gathering of abolitionists come from a wide area to hear prominent speakers discuss the need to abolish slavery.

The family of Rev. Dr. William Lyman was especially prominent in the abolition movement. One son, Huntington Lyman, became a prominent traveling speaker for the American Anti-Slavery Society. Another son, Ralston Lyman, remained in Arcade, where his home was one of the "stations" in town that assisted fugitives on their way to Canada via the Underground Railroad. A son-inlaw, Charles Shepard, was one of the leaders of the Liberty Party in New York State, and is known to have hosted the noted abolitionist Frederick Douglass in his home on at least one occasion.

Other perfectionist ideas that took hold in our church were temperance and women's rights. Not everyone, however, agreed with the perfectionists, and a deep schism in 1849-50 nearly caused a permanent end to the church. This division was eventually healed, and the church was served by two more Oberlin-educated pastors between 1857 and 1864. Church membership grew after the Civil War, and in 1877 the old church building was moved down the street and the present church was built on the same site at the corner of Church and Main streets.

## **Fall Western Area Meeting**

The Fall meeting of the Western New York Area Churches in Covenant on November 3, 2019, began with reports from the 2019 UCC New York Conference Annual Meeting, the 2019 Disciples of Christ General Assembly, the UCC Biennial Synod, and the 2019 youth mission trips to an impoverished area of Philadelphia. A worship service followed the reports, which ended with an offering, which was sent to the disaster ministries of the Disciples and the UCC. Ways to help your church be a little "greener" were also shared, including: not using Styrofoam take-out boxes (substitute something recyclable), recycle more (silverware, plasticware, etc.), and to change from plastic communion cups to glass ones.

The next part of the afternoon was the annual business meeting, during which reports were approved and officers were elected for 2020. The treasurer's report and the proposed 2020 budget were discussed, with much of the discussion dealing with the Area Council's decision to increase the Covenantal Share amount to \$8.00 per reported member in 2021. The budget was eventually approved, and the new and continuing officers were installed. Everyone who attended appreciated the hospitality shown by the people at the Cleveland Heights Christian Church.
