Seeing Through a New Lens

The book of Acts in the Bible introduces a man named Saul, also known as Paul, who was a persecutor of the early Christian church. We first meet Saul when he approves, and is present at, the stoning of Stephen. Following Stephen's death, *"Saul was ravaging the church by entering house after house; dragging off both men and women, he committed them to prison" (Acts 8:1b-3, NRSV).*

I have read this verse many times over the years but never considered it in the way I do today. I read and understand it now in relation to the Karen refugee church where I serve as pastor, and the current political climate in the United States.

In the United States there are few days that go by without hearing something related to immigration issues. Amongst the complexity and chaos of all these issues are refugees.

Refugees are defined by the United Nations Higher Council for Refugees (UNHCR) as "those who have been forced to flee his or her country because of persecution, war or violence. A refugee has a wellfounded fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership in a particular social group. Most likely, they cannot return home or are afraid to do so" (Refugee Facts: What is a Refugee?, 2025).

I am privileged to pastor New Light Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Buffalo, NY. Our congregation, mainly Karen refugees, has been worshipping and serving the community together for seventeen years. Our Karen members include Green Card holders, naturalized citizens, asylees, and foreign students, all legally residing in the U.S.

The Karen people are from Myanmar (formerly Burma). For decades, the Karen people and other multiethnic groups have left Myanmar to avoid the conflict with the Burmese army. Most of the refugees at NLCC waited several years before they could relocate to the United States, residing in some of the nine camps along the Thailand-Myanmar border.

On his first day as president, Trump signed executive orders to indefinitely suspend the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP), stopping refugee admissions and processing, with a few exceptions. Foreign aid was frozen (Laurence Benenson, 2025). This action drastically impacted refugees and those involved in their relocation and safety.

This administration's policies have created a climate of fear and uncertainty here and around world. NLCC experiences it as we have friends and loved ones in camps and who are displaced within Myanmar, facing reduced or no humanitarian aid. There is uncertainty about reuniting with family members who were undergoing resettlement processing. Students worry about deportation before completing their education, and those wishing to visit family abroad fear they may not be allowed back into the U.S. There is anxiety over being targeted by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and deported for being Asian. Who would think that we would have to discuss how to be safe

in a country meant to welcome and protect those who live here.

It is not legal to deport refugees on the basis that they are refugees. However, this administration's policies have created an environment where even refugees with no criminal record could encounter an increased risk of deportation because of stringent enforcement and potentially broader interpretations of immigration violations (Barrón-López, 2025).

While the Trump administration aims to deport unauthorized immigrants and criminals, Green Card holders, students, asylees, and even citizens are sometimes detained and deported. ICE has been prioritizing rapid processing and having to meet daily arrest quotas, leading to wrongful arrests. They can also enter courthouses, schools, hospitals, and places of worship, exacerbating the fear (Walters, 2025; Laurence Benenson, 2025).

The story of Saul's beginnings can be easily read through the lens of a refugee, as Saul's early story reflects the current situation of refugees in the U.S. They fear prison or deportation due to their identity, similar to how early Christians feared Saul's persecution. Luke, the author of Acts, highlights the suffering and fear Saul caused, depicting him as an evil figure. Perhaps Saul can be understood as representing those who inflict harm and fear on others today.

Thankfully, Saul's story has good news. In Acts, chapter nine, Saul's life was changed (Acts 9:1-31, NRSV). Saul is on the road to Damascus, with persecutions on his mind, when "a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting'" (Acts 9:1-5, NRSV).

Following that encounter of God's grace and call on his life, Saul became a dedicated follower of Jesus, spreading the Good News of the risen Christ in word and deed.

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This story gives us hope! If God can change the heart of a contemptible person such as Saul, God can change the hearts of those who contribute to the unjust treatment of God's people today. We pray for them, and we continue to show forth God's love, hoping it will find them. That Jesus will stop them on their path, speak their names and hold them accountable by asking, "Why do you persecute me?"

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Hi, friends: I don't know about you but recently I had been completely immersed in viewing television as journalists and photographers, clergy and parishioners, brought us right into St. Peter's Square to witness the funeral of Pope Francis. Then, I became immersed in watching the next historic process involving Cardinals electing the new Pope. I became so caught up in these doings, that I decided to share with you **my** story about **my** Pope. Yes, I had one (a story, that is). Enjoy!

I once 'met' a Pope. We didn't shake hands, he didn't offer me a personal blessing, but I felt his powerful spirituality reaching me all the way to the back of the room of the conference room we shared.

In 1957, after college graduation and a year of hard work, I managed to stash enough money away to plan a summer's trip to Europe. Two other friends from Hunter College did the same. We sweet-talked our bosses into giving us the summer off (without pay, of course) and sailed on an Italian ship to England's white cliffs of Dover. From there, on a tour with 10 other graduates from around the U.S., we made our way by trains, buses and planes through six countries until we landed in Rome.

I soon learned that one of those friends, Mary, had come from home with two invitations to pay a visit to Pope Pius XII. I felt like she had won the lottery. Putting my envy aside, I convinced myself she would ask Marianne, who was also Catholic, to join her on this memorable occasion.

Instead, Mary invited me to go along. I have never known why, but true to my religious heritage as a Protestant, I protested. Well, sort of, but she convinced me. I could not have been more excited. The day finally arrived. Picturing us joining the thousands of pilgrims who routinely greeted the Pope in St. Peter's Square, I was proven wrong. We didn't go there but instead made our way to his summer residence, Castel Gandolfo, 16 miles from Rome on Lake Albano.

When we reached our destination, we were ushered into a large reception area filled with maybe 100 folks. It felt intimate, as if we were waiting to greet our own pastor during the church coffee hour. I thought I would be nervous but was soon marveling at the diversity in that room: a sea of faces from many cultures, all sizes, all colors, all excited to be there. Several agile men scrambled up on the wide windowsills to gain a better view.

Finally, Pope Pius XII joined us and advancing toward the mic, began speaking. Fluent in seven languages, he spoke slowly in several, including English. I don't remember what he said, but I do know it felt welcoming. The spirit in that room was electric, all of us holding our breaths and standing absolutely immobile so that we wouldn't miss a word. Then, it was time for him to bless rosaries. The one I held tightly in my hand I presented to my sister-in-law later, to her amazement. She certainly wasn't expecting that! The time with him was too short. I imagine others felt that way, too, as we made our way quietly out into the sunshine.

I share this memory with you because of the headlines that dominated the newspapers at this time in our history; the funeral of Pope Francis exemplified the simple life he lived daily among the faithful.

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Now we have experienced another historic Papal occasion. The flick, "Conclave" unlocked a door we have not been able to go through before. I hadn't realized there was so much politicking among the Cardinals!

It was an exciting time for those of us watching the black smoke turn white. My trip to visit a Pope makes it so much more alive to me. Thank you, Mary, wherever you are....

I believe it would be safe to say that the Western Association is on the cutting edge of youth activity in New York State! We are pleased to announce the completion of the roof and dormer window replacement at Mother's Memorial. This iconic building had taken a beating from Father Time and Mother Nature. You'll notice a new black metal roof, as well as new clean and clear glass windows that are tightly sealed and let in abundant light. This major renovation will enhance the exterior of Mother's, as well as protect the interior of this historic building for generations to come.

The structure was designed to serve as an allpurpose assembly hall. Construction began in 1923, with funds collected from the Atlantic, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and New York State Sunday School leagues. The primary fundraisers from these groups were mothers who had lost their sons in World War I. Later, as a fitting tribute to their sacrifice, this building was renamed... Mother's Memorial.

Western Area Treasurer's Report

As summer (finally) dawns in Western New York, your Area treasurer knows what every church treasurer knows: that although bills have a metronomic regularity, giving does not. I get it; it's distracting to see sunshine in WNY. We all have plenty of pent-up demand for play.

Covenant Share obligations for most of our modestsized churches are not budget breakers. Typically, the majority of churches put off paying the year's "dues" until close to the end of the year. That's perfectly sensible and we are happy to take the funds whenever they come in. But it would be helpful to consider perhaps scheduling that one-time payment halfway through the year, or breaking it into a couple chunks and sending one mid-year and the remainder at the end of the year. Although we can manage our cash-flow requirements without a steady flow on the supply side, it would be helpful to have a little more flowing in through the summer.

Your local church treasurer would tell you the same thing, I'm sure, so don't forget to send your envelopes to church even when you're playing hooky. This is my public service announcement on behalf of church bookkeepers everywhere. Thanks for your attention. You may now return to your gleeful appreciation of late spring and summer.

ENDOWMENT REPORT

The Finance Committee voted at its September 2024 meeting to move from the Capital Group's American Funds to a more socially responsible group of funds. Our investment advisor found several funds that are managed by Osaic Wealth, Inc., and the transfer from American to Osaic took place on January 6 and 7, 2025. The value of the American Funds on December 31, 2024 was \$49,258.12, and on March 31, 2025 there was \$3.78 in interest remaining in that account. The total value of the Osaic funds on March 31 was \$48,576.34, so the combined total for the two funds decreased by \$677.78 in the first quarter of 2025.

The value of the United Church Funds account ending in 010 was \$70,272.97 on December 31. The value at the end of March was \$73,975.64, an increase of \$3,702.67.

The largest share of our endowment funds is in the United Church Funds account ending in 009. This is the account from which we usually transfer money early in the year as our annual disbursement to the Western Area checking account. The 2025 Western Area budget that was approved at the annual meeting in November called for a disbursement of \$36,181, and that transfer took place on February 18. The value of that account on December 31 was \$650,619.06, and the value on March 31 was \$610,193.01. This decrease of \$40,426.05 was largely due to the disbursement that took place in February.

The total value of our investments at the end of 2024 was \$770,150.15, and the total value at the end of the first quarter was \$732,748.99. We always show a decrease during the first quarter, and our decrease in the first quarter of 2025 was \$37,401.16. We usually catch up by the end of the year, but with the current uncertainty in the financial markets, that might not happen in 2025. This could affect the amount of disbursement that will be determined when we develop the 2026 budget.
