Associate Conference Minister (ACM) for Search and Call Snapshot And Welcoming Diversity Inventory Description

The ACM for Search and Call position was created two years ago, when the ACM for Communication and On-line Community position was created, and Rev. Ryan Henderson moved into that position full-time.

I was hired as a half-time ACM, to resource the Western Area churches and pastors, to support the Western Association Committee On Ministry, to support the WNYACIC (Western NY Area Churches in Conference) council, and to serve as a Conference-wide resource to all pastors and churches in transition.

When a pastor in transition completes their profile in the NY Conference, I review it, along with their background check, and then validate it so that it may be circulated to other UCC Conferences. When a Western Area church is in transition, I provide them with materials, resources, and guidance to get their Local Church Profile up on the National UCC Website.

I also guide churches in reviewing profiles, interviewing potential candidates, and answering questions as they come up in the search process. Before a congregation can post their Local Church Profile, I walk them through the **Welcoming Diversity Inventory**. I do this for all UCCNY congregations, along with their local ACM.

This begins with a PowerPoint presentation to the Search Committee on Inventory vocabulary and terms that may be new to a congregation, along

with a discussion on what the Inventory is designed to do, and what it does not do.

It is designed to sensitize a congregation around issues related to calling pastors from marginalized communities: LGBTQI+ persons, pastors of color, pastors with physical challenges and pastors with mental health challenges (Post-traumatic stress, Depression, Anxiety issues).

It does not 'collect data' on a congregation, it is not used to compare congregations, it does not result in a 'score', and it is not used to label a congregation.

The information collected in the survey is for the individual congregation's use only, and raw data is given to the congregation at the end of the survey, or destroyed, depending on that congregation's wishes.

A congregational meeting to go over the results is the final step before a congregation's profile is posted. Typically, the local ACM, myself, and pastor from a marginalized community will meet to go over the results, and offer any observations or comments.

Once a Local Church Profile is posted, I forward Pastoral Profiles to UCCNY churches in transition at the request of the potential candidate. I cannot send a profile without it being requested, and I cannot withhold a profile unless the local congregation requests a 'hold' on all profiles. I will assist any UCCNY congregation in crafting a call agreement with the pastor they wish to call and will work with any called candidates to make sure that the agreement is just and fair to both parties.

When able to travel, (and it looks like I can begin again in September) I try and come to the Buffalo area twice a month, around the Committee

on Ministry meeting (second Monday of the month) and the WNYACIC meeting (third Monday of the month). I typically try and fit meetings in with search committees, individual pastors, and lay leaders. I will travel upon request if necessary. Although I am a half-time local church pastor, serving Fairmount Community Church UCC on the west side of Syracuse, I have six Sundays a year where I serve UCCNY churches in preaching, or leading worship.

Staff meet once a week, for a short (one hour) check in, and once a month for a longer, (three hour) staff meeting lead by our Conference Minister, Rev. David Gaewski.

This is just a snapshot of some of the things I do. Each day is different! As I begin transitioning back to my travel schedule, I hope to see more of the Western Area members!

The Bible Provides an Alternative Identity

ARCADE CHURCH INSTALLS PASTOR BOWER

The Arcade United Church of Christ, Congregational, installed Joshua B. Bower as its pastor and teacher during an afternoon service on Sunday, August 1. Pastor Bower began serving the church as a supply pastor in March 2020, shortly after the start of the pandemic, and was called to serve as pastor and teacher the following month.

For the next year, when in-person worship services were not feasible, he worked with others in the church to upgrade the technology required to provide quality livestreamed worship services. Although in-person worship resumed several months ago, a number of people in the area and in several states have continued to watch the livestreamed services.

In addition to Pastor Bower's family and friends and members of the congregation, many other clergy members were present for the installation service. The Gospel was read by Rev. Shawn Hannon, pastor of Hope Lutheran Church in Arcade, and the main message was delivered by Rev. Marna Pritchard, who served as Pastor Bower's mentor. Following the rite of installation by Rev. Laurie Heidenreich and Betty Krist, representing the Western Association, a greeting was read from Rev. Gary Ferner of the New York Conference, and a video greeting from representatives of the Central Southeast Ohio Association of the Heartland Conference was shown. The charges to the congregation and to Pastor Bower were given by Rev. Robert Dievendorf, who was recently designated as pastor emeritus of the Arcade church.

Pastor Bower, who serves the church on a three-quarter-time basis, is continuing his studies at Chicago Theological Seminary in preparation for ordination. He lives in his hometown of Ellicottville with his wife, Nicole.

Pastor Josh Bower had this to say regarding his installation at Arcade United Church of Christ, "I am honored to be called by God and the wonderful people of Arcade United Church of Christ to serve in this community. I am looking forward to seeing the plans that God has in store for our church and the greater Pioneer area. I want to express my gratitude to everyone who made the Installation Service and reception so special and meaningful."

From Rev. Nancy Rosas, Pilgrim-St. Luke's UCC

Here are some things that Pilgrim St. Luke's UCC has incorporated in the last year and is keeping:

- We learned how to do it and have incorporated Hybrid Worship (Online and in-person simultaneously). Hybrid worship encourages inclusion; accessibility for everyone, especially for homebound people; people who are sick; people who live far from church or even in other cities and states who are looking for a church!
- Ministry team meetings by Zoom. We find that they tend to be more efficient timewise and allow more participation. People don't have to rush and drive from work to be in the church building for a meeting.
- Creative ways to connect outdoors to nurture faith, resilience, and joy.
- Creative ways to celebrate birthdays and rites of passage for people (cars parades or front-lawn little parties).
- Learning, practicing embodied practices.
- Online rituals and prayer time.

This pandemic has pushed me as a pastor and the congregation I serve to adapt to a changing environment, especially regarding pandemic guidelines. Some of the temporary "get through this" measures are now adopted as our new normal. Here is a list of what I call ministry enhancements.

1. ***Use of technology***

- Zoom for worship and a Read Aloud/Read Along book during the winter.
- Increase use of Facebook.
- YouTube for mini-worship experiences (each week from 3/2020-4/2021), now I use for special times. Also, I used YouTube for two Lenten programs: Read through the Kid's Bible each day for 40 days and did a Bible Study having other pastors present on the seven last words of Jesus; pre-recorded Christmas program with various families.
- Use of email for devotions and updates.

2. ***Creative outreach to our community***

- Prayer flags and milagros. This is a prayer ministry using a clothesline strung outside for members of the community and congregation to share prayers.
- We made various gifts for the residents of Aurora Park—Valentines, Easter eggs and Bug centerpieces. The bugs were created from non-recyclable materials. They were quite whimsical. The bugs were secured to branches.
- For those without internet access, I connect through USPS each week. Periodically, I do a special mailing to others in the congregation.

3. ***Worship***

- Each person has his/her own communion cup.
- We will be enjoying more outdoor worship services. During August we worshipped in our parking lot.

Western Area Treasurer’s Report

Thanks to all the churches who have so faithfully supported the wider ministry of the Western Area. We have a small operational deficit, but overall, our financial position is sound.

In September, each church will receive a letter that will report their giving to date for 2021 as well as each church’s Covenantal Share for 2022 (based on reported membership in the 2021 Yearbook). Although the 2022 budget process has not begun, the estimates which will be sent will reflect the current Covenantal Share of \$8 per member. The Per Capita support to the NY Conference UCC will continue at \$2 per member. We ask churches who combine payments for Per Capita and Covenantal Share in one check to indicate the amount for each category.

2021 has not meant a ‘return to normal’ exactly, but as we navigate the changes in our churches, families, and workplaces, we are confident of the unchanging grace of God to sustain us in every age.

ENDOWMENT NEWS

Our Endowment accounts continued to increase in value during the second quarter of 2021.

As of June 30, 2021, we had \$35,629.34 in the American Funds (up from \$33,699.79 in March); \$30,376.23 in the United Church Funds Account 010 (up from \$29,074.96 in March); and \$432,735.48 in the United Church Funds Account 009 (up from \$416,067.77 in March).

The total value of our Endowment on June 30 was \$498,741.05, which was an increase of \$19,898.53 from the March 31 total.

Grants Available

by Pastor Ted Brelsford, Faith UCC, Boston

Grants from the Department of Community Ministries (DCM) are available to congregations to help develop new ministries serving their local community or bringing them into closer connection with their community or neighborhood. If members of your congregations work with local community groups doing community ministry, applications to fund such ministries may be considered. The intention of these grants is to support, encourage, and provide kickstart funding to churches in responding to the needs of their community. If you have an idea for outreach in your community in response to the pandemic or anything else, feel free to contact us and we will be glad to help you explore and develop a fundable plan. Any member congregation in good standing with the WNYACIC is eligible to apply.

A grant can be requested for a maximum of \$1500 and can be renewed for a maximum of three years per project, per church. A church may request up to two grants per calendar year.





When Haiti Is No Longer in the News, Will You Be Praying for Our Mission Partners There?

When news headlines cry out about some calamity or catastrophe in some distant land, do you check to see if one of our UCC/DoC global missionaries or mission partners are already there? Chances are, they are.

Such was the case when on July 7th when I heard that Haiti's President had just been assassinated, sending the nation into turmoil. Immediately I went to our Global Ministries website (globalministries.org) and checked for Haiti and found we had two mission partners there. And one of them touched me deeply: The House of Hope (sponsored by the non-profit Ecumenical Foundation for Peace and Justice) in Port-au-Prince.

House of Hope's primary mission is to support and advocate for *restaveks*, children who are forced to work as domestic indentured servants, providing them with tutoring and classes, giving them the education they need but cannot receive because they cannot attend school. House of Hope also focuses on assisting "young mothers, single girls, and elderly women who've been abandoned, providing them a safe place where they can learn social skills... and a professional trade. House of Hope also has a broader program to promote a peaceful resolution to conflict within the community through leadership development for community leaders and former gang members."

Even during the pandemic when classes were suspended, House of Hope "continued to walk alongside 350 families, providing them food, medical care, financial support, and psychological assistance."

One of their success stories is Marie, a little girl whose widowed mother (with other younger children) could not afford to send her to school.

But over the last five years, Marie has excelled in her studies: *"She is a dedicated student. Today, she is a 6th-grade student who dreams of becoming a nurse so that she can one day help other people."*

Soon after I learned about House of Hope, Haiti suffered a 7.2 earthquake and then almost immediately tropical storm Grace. Through it all, our mission partners are there, day in and day out, caring for neighbors well beyond their established programs, touching the lives of those we would seek to touch if we could go there in person.

Please keep Haiti and House of Hope in your thoughts and prayers well after the news cycle moves on. And you can personally get involved by giving directly to House of Hope. There are three ways to give:
